# **Subject Overviews**

This booklet gives you a description of the curriculum that your child will follow at Key Stage 4, along with the qualifications that can be gained.

Our unique curriculum design is related to the local context of the school and to meeting the needs of all learners and equip children and young people with the skills required to become independent learners and active citizens. The curriculum at Brent Knoll has children and young people at its very heart and is underpinned by our five core values: responsibility, respect, kindness, fairness and honesty. We believe in delivering an exciting and varied, language and communication-rich curriculum that is stimulating, challenging and fun; a curriculum that celebrates and respects diversity. In addition, we bring learning to life for our pupils by offering real-life learning experiences and a wealth of extra-curricular opportunities.

At Key Stage 4, students follow accreditation in all aspects of the curriculum. At KS4 students follow one of three flexible learning pathways; Tor, Dune or Knoll, based on their prior attainment. Phonics and reading play a key role at all Key Stages as this enables students' greater opportunities to access all areas of the curriculum and life beyond school.

## Entry Level Certificate

This exam-based course will enable students to develop their skills in all areas of English. Students will be required to respond to a range of literary and non-literary texts, whilst developing their skills to write and communicate clearly in a variety of contexts. The course has been designed to help with the development of functional language skills. A practical assessment focuses on the development of communication skills both individually and within a group setting.

## Additional English Course

This course enables students to respond to a range of units including: Shakespeare, film, and narrative writing. Students are assessed through course work, and key tasks enable them to develop skills in reading and writing.

# GCSE English Language

This exam-based course requires students to understand and respond to literary and non-fiction texts. They will also develop skills linked to the writing of creative, transactional and persuasive texts. Communication skills are addressed through a 'Spoken Language' unit.

## Overview:

A key aim for Functional Skills mathematics specifications is that they enable the student to gain confidence and fluency in, and a positive attitude towards, mathematics. This course has been designed to enable learners to focus on the key maths skills that will be required for everyday life. It develops number skills and puts maths into real-life contexts enabling students to use money, budget, tell the time and use calendars, gain some understanding of how various jobs use maths daily.

Entry Level Certificate in Science

Enables students to:

- acquire a body of basic scientific knowledge and an understanding of some important scientific ideas
- develop basic experimental and investigative abilities
- recognise the difference between scientific and non-scientific ideas and explanations
- develop a basic understanding of some of the important technological and environmental applications of science and the economic, ethical and social implications
- develop communication and analytical skills including confidence in expressing debating ideas
- develop literacy, numeracy and ICT skills as appropriate to them and the centre resources that are available

#### Overview:

This qualification includes units for developing skills and knowledge in a range of subject areas, including: History, Geography and Religious Studies. Presently, in History we cover units of work on Britain in the 1960s and the history of health and medicine. In Geography our units are about tectonic events and Sustainable tourism, we also look at our local area. For Religious Studies, we look at the topic of Prejudice and Discrimination and at some religious festivals. Accreditation is by coursework only which can be passed at level 2 or 3.

### Overview:

The PE curriculum at Brent Knoll school is designed to get students:

- To demonstrate the ability to use at least four exercises/stretches to provide an activity specific warm up.
- To demonstrate the ability to show at least three relevant health and safety considerations.
- To demonstrate the ability to show or communicate at least three improvements to basic sport skills.
- To demonstrate the ability to coach or lead an activity to a group.
- To demonstrate the ability to evaluate own performance in leading a session.
- To be able to provide knowledge of a good sports leader and why they are considered good.
- To be able to understand at least two components of physical fitness, e.g. aerobic endurance and muscular endurance

#### Overview:

A life-changing experience. A fun time with friends. An opportunity to discover new interests and talents. A tool to develop essential skills for life and work. A recognised mark of achievement; respected by employers.

The DofE is many things to many people, supporting generations to successfully navigate adult life.

14-24-year-olds (from Year 9 onwards at Brent Knoll School) are selected to follow the DofE programme at one of three progressive levels which, when successfully completed, leads to a Bronze, Silver or Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

There are <u>four sections</u> to complete at Bronze and Silver level and five at Gold. They involve helping the community/environment, becoming fitter, developing new skills, planning, training for and completing an expedition and, for Gold only, working with a team on a residential activity.
